

Dear Neighbors

As the seasons change and we move toward warmer weather, we also see progress unfolding in University City. The Target and Dierbergs stores and several infill lots at the Market at Olive are beginning to take shape. Development also is underway in the Loop at the former Craft Alliance site, and further west on Delmar, the Avenir apartments are welcoming new tenants. Additionally, the Council has adopted the Third Ward Task Force plan, and the long-promised resources for the Third Ward from the Market at Olive development are becoming a reality.

Market at Olive Progress: What's Happening This Summer

Construction is continuing at the Market at Olive with a special focus on two major retailers, Target Stores and Dierbergs Markets, situated on the north and south sides of Olive, respectively. Both retailers anticipate creating numerous full- and part-time jobs, ranging from entry-level to managerial and specialized positions, contributing to University City's growth and opportunities.

TARGET STORES

Construction is progressing smoothly with significant progress on the parking garage structure and work on the store foundations have begun.



DIERBERGS MARKETS

Construction is poised to begin within the next few weeks on Dierbergs Markets' new store which will be the centerpiece of the south side of the Market at Olive development. In addition to the new 75,000-square-foot store, the project will also include two multi-tenant buildings, adding approximately 8,500 square feet of new retail, dining and service space along Olive Blvd.



Thanks to the development team of Bob Clark (Clayco), Larry Chapman (Seneca Commercial Real Estate), Caroline Saunders (general counsel), and David Hutkin (Hutkin Properties Group, LLC), the Market at Olive is steadily transforming into a vibrant shopping destination. Stay tuned for more updates as the project continues and expect to see plenty of changes this summer and beyond.

Renovation Progress Continues on Historic Annex and Trinity Buildings

The extensive renovations of the historic Annex and Trinity buildings located behind City Hall are well underway. The project aims to transform the 36,000-square-foot Annex into a cutting-edge police headquarters and repurpose the 8,512-square-foot Trinity building into a multipurpose Municipal Court facility with designated areas for public use.

Over the next few months construction activity will intensify, impacting nearly every aspect of the buildings. Work will progress in sequence, beginning with electrical rough-ins in some areas and advancing to drywall hanging and taping in other areas. On average, 60-70 workers will be onsite daily, ensuring steady progress toward completing both buildings and their respective parking lots in Spring 2026.

With a balance of preservation and modernization, the revitalized Annex and Trinity buildings will stand as testaments to the City's commitment to progress and heritage. Key project milestones for the coming months include:

- Completing weathertight building envelopes
- Structural modifications and improvements
- Wall framing and drywall installation
- Roof repairs, including slate restoration
- Beginning work on finishes

Throughout the renovation, the historic facades are being meticulously preserved, while the interiors are upgraded to meet modern operational standards. Public service enhancements such as a new accessible entrance, improved parking and full ADA compliance remain central to the project. These updates will ensure that both buildings provide state-of-the-art facilities tailored to their respective functions while maintaining their historical integrity.




Summer Reading Is Back at U City Library!

For adult patrons, the 2025 Adult Summer Reading Big Book Challenge focuses on Homer's *The Odyssey*, translated by Emily Wilson. The first English translation by a woman, this edition gives new insight into the epic Greek poem nearly 3,000 years after its inception.

Adult programs also include monthly book discussions, as well as a series of programs highlighting Greek culture and mythology, including a lecture on the book by Washington University classics professor Kathryn Wilson on Wed., June 11; guided tour exploring the themes of Greek mythology at the St. Louis Art Museum on Wed., July 9; demonstration of Greek dance by the St. Nicholas Greek Dance Troupe on Wed., July 16; and film screening of *O, Brother, Where Art Thou?*, the Coen Brothers film adaptation of *The Odyssey*, on Wed., Aug. 6. All adult events are free and open to all, though advance registration is required for the art museum tour. HOLIDAY SCHEDULE FOR TRASH AND RECYCLING COLLECTION



Memorial Day, Mon., May 26 - No trash or recycling collection on holiday. All trash and recycling routes during the week of May 26th will be collected the day AFTER your normal collection day.

Juneteenth Day, Thurs., June 19 - No trash or recycling collection on holiday. All trash and recycling routes for June 19 will be collected on Friday, and Friday's collection routes will be collected on Saturday.

Independence Day, Fri., July 4 - No trash or recycling collection on holiday. Friday trash and recycling routes will be picked up on Saturday, July 5.

West Area: July 7-11

East Area: July 14-18

Refuse Rate Increase & Yard Waste Sticker Requirement Eliminated

U City residents no longer need to purchase yard waste stickers for collection. The City Council approved this change as part of ongoing efforts to simplify waste services and reduce costs for residents. Solid Waste Refuse Rate Increases

To maintain high-quality waste services amid rising operational costs, the City Council recently approved an 8.4 percent increase in refuse rates, effective April 1, 2025. Beginning next year in March 2026, rates will increase annually by 3 percent based on the Consumer Price Index (CPI). The Solid Waste Rate Study Task Force recommended these adjustments after analyzing collection expenses. Additional revenue will support rising disposal costs, infrastructure improvements, and environmental compliance. For more information, contact the Finance Department at 314.505.8544.

LAWN MOWER ADVICE - STAY SAFE AND HAPPY MOWING!

As the weather warms up many of us are heading outdoors to tackle our lawns. While mowing your yard is a great way to maintain your property and stay active, it's important to keep safety in mind. On average there are 85,000 lawn mower related injuries each year, including fatalities. And over 9,000 of the injured are children under 18. Here are 5 essential lawn mower safety tips:

1. Prepare Space: Before you mow remove sticks or rocks because mower blades can propel sticks or rocks like a bullet.
2. Dress Safe: Closed toe shoes will protect your feet better than bare feet or sandals.
3. Protect Others: Children under 12 should be supervised while using a lawn mower and younger children should be away from the yard being mowed.
4. Practice Caution: Keep hands and feet away from spinning blades.
5. Beware of burns: The engine and exhaust are hot and can cause burns if touched.

By following these simple but important safety steps, you can help ensure a safe and enjoyable lawn care experience for yourself and those around you.

Successful Policing Relies on Commitment to Training, Technology, and Transparency



The University City Police Department (UCPD) continues to advance innovative 21st-century policing principles, focusing on technology, transparency, crime prevention, community engagement, modernized training and responsible recruiting. University City citizens, stakeholders, and business owners are priority audiences, and we actively foster open communication through focus groups, study sessions, and town hall forums.

University City police officers receive extensive training in observation, decision-making, and practical action. All officers are certified in Crisis Intervention and de-escalation techniques, which are incorporated into “Active Intruder” training to help keep our community safe.

UCPD also prioritizes enhancing officers’ emotional intelligence while increasing their skillsets to minimize the likelihood of tragic incidents. As an active Multi-Assault Counter-Terrorism Action Capabilities (M.A.C.T.A.C.) trained agency, UCPD collaborates with regional law enforcement, and several M.A.C.T.A.C.-trained instructors serve within our department.

University City officers, like all St. Louis County and City law enforcement personnel, are continuously trained to:

- Respond to threats immediately rather than wait
- Assess injuries
- Collaborate with fire and emergency medical services during crises
- Work effectively with other public safety agencies and outside resources
- Partner with school districts and religious institutions
- Protect the community

The M.A.C.T.A.C. program, originally developed by the Los Angeles Police Department, was introduced to the Greater St. Louis area by the St. Louis County Police Department’s Tactical Operations Unit (SWAT) in 2012.

Since then, UCPD has conducted hundreds of training sessions for schools, religious institutions, City employees, and businesses on best practices for responding to active shooter incidents. UCPD was one of the first public safety departments in St. Louis City and County to implement M.A.C.T.A.C. techniques in educational settings.

Working closely with University City Schools has resulted in several innovative programs. For the past 13 years, UCPD has provided training twice a year for all University City Public Schools, customizing each session for the specific school and property, utilizing comprehensive training materials rather than condensed versions. Since 2018, UCPD has expanded its hands-on scenario training in partnership with the school district to provide regular training at University City High School, Brittany Woods Middle School, and other buildings.

In addition to school facilities, the City of Lights Church also serves as a training site. These exercises involve not only UCPD officers but also the University City Fire Department, paramedics, dispatchers, and neighboring public safety agencies, including the Washington University Police Department.

Today, technology plays a critical role in modern law enforcement. UCPD integrates unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs/drones), Throw Bots (robots), License Plate Readers (LPRs), and Closed-Circuit Television (CCTV) into training sessions.

Our “Active Intruder” programs are Missouri P.O.S.T.-certified for law enforcement continuing education credits and align with Department of Homeland Security and FBI standards. School Resource Officers also participate in annual St. Louis County-hosted M.A.C.T.A.C. training alongside officers from across the region.

Enhancing security extends beyond structural reinforcements and law enforcement training. Staying informed about policies, best practices, and maintaining open communication with public safety organizations strengthens overall preparedness.

Prop U's in Full Swing!

This winter and spring marked major progress in the District's facility upgrades. New playgrounds at Pershing and Jackson Park Elementary now offer safe, engaging spaces that promote both play and social growth. Safety remains a top priority, with new security features—like secure entry vestibules, enhanced visibility, and additional cameras—already in place at several schools, with construction on similar upgrades planned at Jackson Park and Flynn Park this summer.

At University City High School, construction will begin this summer on a new multipurpose field at Muhl-Schemmer Stadium, set to serve both students and the broader community. Additional upgrades include a new HVAC system for Flynn Park's gym, a District Soccer+ Field at Jackson Park, and renovations to the UCHS auditorium and Brittany Woods' commercial kitchen.

None of this would be possible without the ongoing support of our community. The District is grateful for your continued investment in creating a safe, welcoming, and inspiring learning environment for all students.
